

38.71 acres PRESERVED!

The Harwich Conservation Trust and the Chatham Conservation Foundation, Inc. partnered in support of the twotown Mill Pond Woodlands Project to preserve approximately 38.71 acres. Preserving the land helps to protect the wellfield recharge area for up to eleven public drinking water well sites across the two towns.

The project represents another success with HCT's *Save Land - Save Water Initiative*, a long-range plan to strategically preserve lands that help protect water resources. The 38.71-acre tract is also the keystone piece next to approximately 235 acres of town-owned open space spanning the Harwich and Chatham border, providing important forested wildlife habitat.

In December 2010, voters at Special Town Meetings in both towns overwhelmingly supported the project. Voters authorized each town to use Community Preservation Act funds for purchasing their respective portions. In June 2011, the Town of Harwich purchased approximately 20.02 acres for \$1 million in Phase One and the Town of Chatham bought approximately 18.69 acres for \$1 million in Phase Two.

To make the total \$2 million project possible, The Compact of Cape Cod Conservation Trusts, Inc. successfully applied for not one, but two \$500,000 state grants that kept each town's net cost to approx. \$500,000 in CPA funds. "Thanks to the state grants and strong voter support, both towns benefited by preserving this land to protect the public water supply that many thousands of residents and visitors depend upon," said Michael Lach, Assistant Director of The Compact and Exec. Director of the Harwich Conservation Trust.

HCT and the Chatham Conservation Foundation, Inc. jointly hold a permanent conservation restriction on the entire 38.71 acres.





Potential New Land Project

Imagine if we could save a piece of upland to protect the Herring River and wildlife ...

as well as complete a walking trail loop around the Bell's Neck Conservation Lands/West Reservoir. Right now, the approximately 4-acre property is privately owned without public access, but if negotiations are successful, the Town may have the chance to purchase and preserve the strategically located land.

The Town, HCT, and landowners are in the preliminary stages of determining a purchase price. The Board of Selectmen and various town committees are reviewing the project. The goal is to negotiate terms in time for placing an article on the May Town Meeting warrant.

West Reservoir and the Herring River are popular destinations for kayakers and fishermen while the forested trails around the reservoir attract hikers, joggers, and birdwatchers. The land provides more than 800 feet of shoreline on the West Reservoir, which flows into the Herring River via the herring ladder of Johnson's Flume.



The property also borders the Town's Bell's Neck Conservation Lands on the south and the Cape Cod Rail Trail bikepath on the north. Therefore, if preserved, the land could complete a walking trail loop around the entire reservoir. Stay tuned for details as this project evolves.
